PATIENT SPOTLIGHT

Early November brought us a Great Horned Owl in pretty rough shape. In addition to being very dehydrated and emaciated, the left foot was very swollen due to a massive infection. Antibiotics and daily wound care didn't seem to be doing the trick. The owl was then taken to Wisconsin Humane Society to undergo surgery by our new volunteer veterinarian, Dr. Holly Pollard.



Dr. Pollard amputated the most compromised toe and was able to remove the damaged tissue from within the foot. Upon return to WINC, the owl was fitted with special "boots" made of water noodles to cushion the foot while it healed. Not long after the surgery, the owl was ready for pre-release conditioning. Thanks to one of our dedicated volunteers, the owl was transported to Pine View Rehab Center in Fredonia for live-prey testing. After proving itself to still be capable of hunting, the owl will be taken back to Sullivan where it came from!

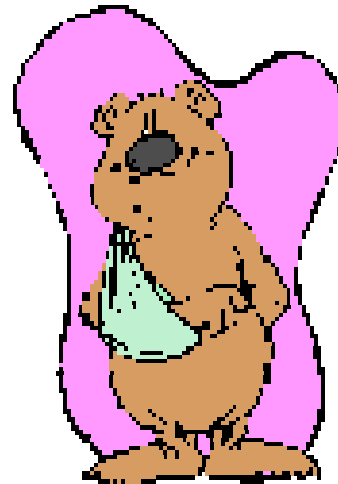
Thank-you Rick for sharing your wonderful personality and great compassion for animals with all of us here at the Wildlife In Need Center!
