WINC'S MISSION: ANIMAL CARE

An Opossum's Resilience for Life

This Virginia Opossum was found on the side of the road, struggling to breathe, covered in blood, and hanging on for dear life after being struck by a vehicle. The caring finders rushed her to our center for emergency help. Staff worked quickly to stabilize her. Upon examination, we found that she had multiple fractures of her jaw and skull, including a split palate (roof of mouth). This

multiple fractures of her jaw and skull, including a split palate (roof of mouth). This poor girl not only had severe injuries to her head, but she also had a fractured leg of the tibia bone.

She was put on "cage rest" to minimize use of her fractured leg and allow time for healing. Staff carefully managed her comfort by providing pain medication, anti-inflammatories, and assisted with hand feeding until she was reliably able to lap up some soft foods on her own.

She was slowly graduated onto more solid foods as her mouth and head injuries continued to heal. Over a few weeks, we saw much improvement in her appetite, and her fractures were becoming more stable.

After about a month in our care, she was finally able to be housed in a larger space to allow more use of her injured leg. Staff exercised her every few days to evaluate her progress. Healing from a fractured leg can take a while, and she isn't quite ready to leave before the cold winter is here. She will be overwintered to allow her injuries to fully heal. In the meantime, she will have a warm, safe place to stay. We are hopeful by early spring she will be feeling much more herself and ready to return to her life in the wild.

Turtle Changes

Last July a Midland Painted Turtle arrived at our clinic with an eye injury. During her time in care, our staff noticed her unusual interest in her caretakers. She would swim toward people and try to take food directly from them, rather than the normal wild behavior of human avoidance. This not only endeared her to all of our animal care volunteers, but alerted our animal care team that it was extremely likely she was kept as a pet at some point in her life. Due to her friendly disposition and permanent vision issues, she was deemed non-releasable.

It is often difficult to find a new home for turtles. Most freshwater turtles can live up to 50 years, so spots at nature centers and other facilities that need education animals open up very infrequently. She stayed in our care for over a year while we searched for a new home for her. In the late spring of this year, we lost our beloved Western Painted Turtle Antoinette. While no one could replace our sweet girl, this created an opening at our center where we knew Twiggy would fit in perfectly.

It took some time for us to acquire a larger aquarium to suit Twiggy's needs- as Antoinette had three missing feet and could only utilize a small swimming area. It took more time for us to apply for Twiggy to be moved from our rehabilitation license to our education license.

After so much waiting and preparation, we announced our newest ambassador on August 22nd and Twiggy has been enjoying her much more spacious tank ever since! She still gets visits from animal care volunteers and has quickly won over the hearts of our education volunteers. She is still learning the ropes of being an education ambassador, but we are confident that she will soon be teaching people all about the wonderful wildlife that can be found all across Wisconsin.

Hook Removal From a Ring-Billed Gull







This Ring-Billed Gull was admitted after he was found with a fishing lure in his mouth and right wing. The lure had two treble hooks (fishing hooks with three points), one of the hooks was in his right shoulder and the other was inside his mouth. The three points on the hook in his mouth were preventing him from opening his beak, which would have been a death sentence if he hadn't been caught. Since many fishing lures are made to look like fish they can easily be mistaken as a tasty meal by wild animals. Once ingested they can cause injury to animals' face, mouths, and GI systems. Animals can also become tangled in the monofilament line, left attached to many of these hooks, leaving them trapped and causing numerous injuries, as the animal struggles to get free.

He was sedated and we carefully removed the hooks, to avoid causing further damage, and cleaned his wounds. The hook in his mouth punctured through his right cheek, upper and lower beak. The one in his right shoulder left multiple puncture wounds and the area was extremely swollen and bruised.

Due to his injuries, he is not self-feeding and needs to be tube fed a specialized diet multiple times a day. He was recently moved to a larger space and is now being housed with another Ring-Billed Gull who is recovering from a fractured wing. For social species, housing them together can actually help their recovery and oftentimes improves their appetite.

Please dispose of any fishing line or trash properly. If you see some in the environment, please pick it up, even if it's not yours. These small acts make a giant impact for animals like him and save lives. Cases like this are entirely human-caused and can be easily prevented.



How Can You Help?

- Don't forget your local wildlife during the winter. Sometimes water is hard to find.
 Consider putting out a heated birdbath or a shallow pan of water in the sun during the day. You will enjoy watching your visitors!
- If possible, avoid taking trees down between March and September during squirrel breeding season.
- Bring your Christmas Trees to WINC!
 Take off all the tinsel and decorations first. We can use them for enrichment activities for our patients that will be with us over the winter.
- Become a member or Join our Wildlife Animal Champion monthly donor members!
- Good Harvest Market in Pewaukee gives an EcoToken to shoppers who bring a reusable bag. Shoppers donate those tokens to local nonprofits at the store. WINC receives 10 cents per token.

- Bring us your grocery receipts from Albrecht's Sentry in Delafield, and Piggly Wiggly in Hartland and Oconomowoc. We turn them in for a portion of the totals.
- Get a Kwik Trip Rewards Card and have your and have your rebate go to WINC. Kwik Trip donates an additional 1% too.
- Check with your employer to see if they match charitable donations.
- All adult wildlife patients are released back home (the area where they were rescued) but the babies do not have established homes yet. We have many different volunteer positions at WINC: Animal Care, Education, Office, Special Events, Landscaping, Maintenance. Our volunteers do amazing work that is crucial, noticed and very appreciated by all.

Did you know that we also have different community groups that help us on occasion?

Oconomowoc High School Beyond 18 Program: Two student interns are coming in to help us 4 mornings each week. They help with laundry, dishes, sweeping and more. The students are building up their life skills knowledge, experience, and also their resumes.

We also were fortunate enough to participate in the Oconomowoc High School's Freshmen Day of Service on October 17. Eleven students and 2 chaperones came to our center and helped us reorganize and clean up outdoor storage areas. It is amazing how much work these students did. We are thrilled with the results! Everything outside is so much better organized!

We occasionally connect with scouts who make items that our patients need, such as perches and nest boxes. We currently have an Eagle Scout Candidate who is working on fixing up part of the pathways between some cages. He's planning, fundraising, and getting ready to install stairs with a hand railing and will improve the pathways in one area to make it safer for all. It's a lot of work. We are so excited about this project to be completed before the end of this year!

Generac hosts a Season of Giving campaign in November and December. Volunteers from Community Programs at Generac will be coming soon to help deep clean and organize our bulk food storage room. This is the perfect time for helping with indoor work that is so needed.

VJS Construction Services has offered us some volunteer time. We are carefully thinking about all that needs to be done and which project would be best suited to their areas of expertise.

Bonus community help makes a great difference for us to have a strong organization with safer grounds, better equipment, and the ability to provide high quality services to our patients and our community. Our regular volunteers are very busy with their volunteer positions. We always have a list of projects that need to be done such as building & fixing cages and equipment, creating/improving new pathways, bettering landscaping.
